

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

We Are the Village

For nearly 120 years Holy Family Day Home has partnered with families to break the cycle of poverty and abuse. Each year, new problems arise for our community that require flexibility and an innovative view on the family support programs that we have designed. At the heart of each program is the desire to empower families and restore their dignity, because we believe that whole-families need support if we are to effectively partner with them to care for their children.

Families need our services because it takes a village to raise a child. We serve Bay Area families who are vulnerable to instability because of their income, or because one parent is raising a family alone. 22% of our families are currently experincing homelessness, a status that can onset overnight. 19% of our families are immigrants to the United States, and new to their communities. 21% of our families have a child with special rights. These situations add tremendous burdens to their day to day lives. We are here to be their village.

Every child deserves the chance to realize their full potential and contribute meaningfully to their community. We have adopted a Reggio Approach to our educational programs in order to support their development as individuals. Their future leadership takes root now, as children in our care take an active role in their educational process.

INTERVIEW with a SHADOW THERAPIST: Erica Morales-Cruz Wants

Everyone to Be Prepared

HFDH: Will you introduce yourself?

EMC: I'm a social worker. I was born and raised in San Francisco. I first went to school at UC Davis to study Sociology and Political Science because I was originally going to become an attorney... until I took an internship with a criminal law office. After seeing how the court system works and how clients needed help in different ways, I was pushed to become a social worker. I then got my Masters in Social Welfare at UC Berkeley.

What does the day to day work look like for a "shadow therapist?"

Shadow therapy is basically working one-on-one with a child in their classroom. I work with parents and teachers to identify children that might have particular needs. These can look like very basic things with children: difficulty sharing, entering play, or communicating during play. For example, learning how to not, say, knock somebody's blocks over! When children aren't regulated well, they tend to lash out. Their frustrations come out with things like hitting, pulling hair, or maybe destroying their friends' Lego setup. So working with a child is teaching them to identify: what's going on in your body? What are you feeling? What other ways could you use to communicate? Could you use your words to say "I'm upset right now!" or "I want someone to play with me?" I do this as individual work with students and also in groups. We're starting our third group series now, which is focused on social skills.

Outside of the classroom, I also do a lot of research.

I'm always reading new books. I go to my local library and read all the new parenting books—there's a new one called "Parenting as a Whale." [she laughs] So what does that look like? I read them so I can know when a parent comes to me and says "I'm reading this new book," I can know where they are coming from. I'm also very interested in any new research that comes out about brain development.



Is it effective to teach these social and emotional skills at such a young age?

Early intervention always seems the best. If we can identify it, help the child catch it, and give them the words to use in the future, that would always be more helpful than waiting for it to become a bigger problem. If children are not given skills to help them become verbal, or if they don't learn basic skills like playing and sharing, it can make it more difficult for them to establish positive friendships. For example, if a child does not learn that it is not ok to hit or shove then they will just use



I understand that you're now a seasoned traveler. Where are some places you've traveled to?





that behavior when they are upset. By the time they enter kindergarten they have difficulty making friends, and they may feel like an outsider. This can lead to more trouble and spill into misbehavior in the class and trouble learning.

Do you see societal factors as playing a role in the fact that some students need more support?

We live in an area that is extremely expensive. Parents are struggling to make it, and sometimes that means working several jobs. They are maybe not spending the amount of quality time that they would like to with their children. There are families that are also struggling to find where to live. They are bouncing around from home to home, or from a friend's house to another friend's place, just to try and make ends meet until something more stable comes along. So that's a really big problem in our community.

What is the most challenging aspect of your job, and what makes you stick with it anyway?

I work with the teachers, and then the kids themselves, and then their parents, and so there is a lot of work to do just in making sure everyone stays on the same page! That can be challenging, but really in the end we're all just hoping for what's in every child's best interests. My biggest hope is that when kids leave here they are moving on to kindergarten with a good start. Not only academically but socially and emotionally—I want them to be prepared. Because that makes them able to learn as they go on into their whole education.
